## Some Deals Are Just Plain Tricky

## ALDER: BRIDGE

$\mathbf{Z}^{\mathrm{d}}$denek Urbanek, a Czech translator and essayist, offered this critique in an interview: "You in the West have a problem. You are unsure when you are being lied to, when you are being tricked. We do not suffer from this; and unlike you, we have acquired the skill of reading between the lines."
Some deals are just plain tricky - if you will excuse the pun. And West has a problem. What is best play by both sides, and what is West's key play after he leads the top-of-nothing heart nine against three no-trump?
North was right to jump straight to three no-trump and not investigate clubs.
West chose a heart on the lead-an-unbid-major principle. This was fortuitous, because South would have romped home on a diamond start.
Declarer has eight top tricks: two spades, four hearts and two clubs. He would hope to score a third club trick to get home. But if East gains the lead in clubs, he might shift to a high diamond and the defenders would take four tricks there.
In an effort to keep East off the lead, South

takes the first trick on the board and calls for the club jack. If East plays low, declarer will run the jack with gratifying results from his point of view. So let's assume East covers with the queen. Now, when South wins with his king, West must unblock his 10 . Then East will get in with his club nine and can make the telling diamond switch.

If West plays low on the first club, declarer will duck in the dummy when West produces the club 10 on the second round of the suit. East never gets in and South cruises home.

## NEW TO USING ELECTRONIC SCORING DEVICES?



Here's Rick Beye explaining how they work. There is one scoring device on each table. After the auction, North enters the contract into a device that looks like an oversized calculator. When play is completed, North enters the result, and then hands the device to one of the opponents to verify that it is accurate. After the opponent OKs the score, it is sent via radio signal to a computer that is compatible with ACBLscore. When the final score of the session is entered, the complete results are available for printout - just as though the data had been entered by hand.

A popular modern agreement is that when partner opens $1 \boldsymbol{\vee}$ or $1 \mathbf{A}$, a jump response of 2 NT is an artificial, forcing raise - the Jacoby 2 NT convention.

## JACOBY 2NT OVER 1•/1.

- four-card or longer support
- 13 or more points

It commits the partnership to game in opener's suit and leaves room to explore for slam. The key to effectively using Jacoby 2NT is what happens after the 2NT response, starting with opener's rebid.

Opener's Rebid After 2NT
To help the partnership decide whether a slam is possible, opener's rebid describes the distribution and strength of opener's hand:

## OPENER'S REBID AFIER 2NT

With shortness:

- a new suit at the three level shows shortness: a singleton or void.
- a jump to the four level in a new suit shows a good five-card side suit.

With no shortness;

- a jump to game in the major shows a minimum opening.
- 3NT shows a medium-strength hand (about 15-17).
- a rebid of the major at the three level shows a maximum (about 18 or more).

For example, suppose we are West and the auction begins:


## If Opener Shows Shortness

When opener shows a singleton or void, responder considers whether this is a good thing or a bad thing for the partnership's slam prospects. Understanding the concept of wasted values is a key to good slam bidding.

Let's look at various hands where opener has a singleton diamond and see how the auction might go:

After West opens $1 \wedge$ and East uses the Jacoby 2NT response, West bids $3 \downarrow$, showing a singleton or void in diamonds. That is not good news for East. The $\checkmark \mathrm{K}$ and $\downarrow \mathrm{Q}$ are not likely to be of much use. East-West will have to lose a diamond trick despite West's singleton and East's 5 HCPs in the suit. So, East simply jumps to 4a, showing no interest in reaching slam. West has a good hand, but not enough to override East's decision. 4at is a good spot since a slam has almost no chance. The defenders should get the $\bullet A$ and a club trick.

Notice that even though the $\varangle K-Q$ can be developed into a trick or two, which is not of much help. West can't discard enough clubs on the diamonds to avoid a club loser. The $\downarrow$ K-Q are essentially wasted values.

If we move East's $\checkmark$ K-Q to different suits, the situation is quite different after West shows the singleton diamond.

Jacoby 2NT

Now, none of East's high cards are wasted now. Although the partnership has no high cards in diamonds, it won't lose more than one trick in the suit because of West's singleton. Being short in diamonds West will have length in hearts and clubs, so East's high cards in those suits are certain to be useful. East will want to move toward slam, perhaps making a cuebid of $3 \checkmark$ to show some interest, or going straight to 4 NT . We'll leave a detailed discussion of slam bidding methods for another time. The point is to recognize when the hands fit well together. Although West's had is the same as before, 6a is now an excellent contract. The defenders will get only one diamond trick....and only if they take it on the opening lead.

Let's keep the West hand the same, but change the East hand again: Now East has two fewer HCPs, and the $\star$ A opposite West's singleton guarantees there are no losers in that suit. So, the auction might go:

East doesn't want to jump to 4t and give up on slam, so East simply bids 3 a to give West an opportunity to show interest. With a good hand, West could ask for aces using the Blackwood (or KCB) convention and then take the partnership to slam when only one Ace is missing. $6 \uparrow$ can be made by trumping two club losers in the East hand. The only trick lost is the $\mathbf{~ A}$. If West had a minimum hand after East showed slam interest with the 3 bid, West could simply bid 4a, showing nothing extra. The partnership would stop safely in game.

So, when opener shows shortness after the Jacoby 2NT bid, responder decides whether to stop in game, bid slam, or invite slam (or explore for slam by cue bidding) based on how well the hands seem to fit together.

## If Opener Shows a Second Five-Card Suit

When opener shows a second suit, responder can also decide whether this makes slam appealing. Supposed these are the combined hands: The auction might go:

Once East finds out that West has a good 5 -card club suit, slam looks possible. East can anticipate that there won't be many losers in $6 \mathbf{v}$ and, after checking for Aces, bids the good slam. The Slam could go down, but it could also make an overtrick. Not bad on 25 combined HCPs.

## If Opener Shows Strength

If opener has no shortness, the decision on whether to bid slam is typically based on combined strength rather than distribution. Suppose these are our combined hands: The auction might go:

East has a good hand for the 2NT response, but West shows a minimum by jumping to $4 \mathbf{v}$. East has no reason to get the partnership higher. Even the five level is too high since the opponents can take the $₫ A$ and $\downarrow A-K$.

If opener shows a medium-strength hand, responder will usually move toward slam. For example:

After West shows about 15-17 points, East makes an invitational jump to $5 \vee$ and West accepts. Not very scientific, but it gets the job done. $6 \checkmark$ is a good contract which will only go down if a spade is led and both the $\wedge A$ and $\wedge Q$ are unfavorably placed. When opener shows a maximum, the partnership will usually be headed for slam or grand slam.

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## BRIDGE

Thank you, Pat!

Although squeeze-play can be very complex, there are many deals in which only a modicum of basic technique is required. Let's look at the unsuccessful approach before we see the


Vuinerable: East-West
Dealer: South
The bidding:
South West North East
1 ${ }^{4}$ Pass 4** Pass
*Short diamonds, agreeing pass Opening lead: Diamond five
winning line.
You play in six spades on a diamond lead to your ace. You ruff a diamond in dummy and play a trump. East rises with the ace and returns a trump to avoid being endplayed. You now run all the trumps, pitching clubs from dummy, but East is under no pressure. On the last trump you bare dummy's club ace, and East comes down to a singleton club himself, taking trick 13 with the heart jack.
The reason the squeeze did not operate was that you could exert no pressure from the club suit. You need to utilize a maneuver called the Vienna Coup. After winning the second trump, try taking the club ace and then running the rumps.
The significant difference is that you come down to four hearts in dummy, with the lead in your hand and the club queen posing a threat against East, who also has sole control of the hearts. What is he to discard? If he pitches his club king, you cash the queen, then take the top hearts. If he tosses

a heart, then dummy is good.
ANSWER: Your partner's three-club call is forcing. It is fundamentally a try for game in hearts, though it could be showing a better hand than that. To get your spectacular trumps and singleton diamond across, jump to four diamonds. In all such auctions a jump like this is a splinter, promising a singleton diamond and suitability for slam.

The master to her left was looking at a hand containing 14 points on which he considered bidding. He turned to the opening bidder's partner and asked, "What kind of no trumps do you play?" The expert with the 14 point hand turned to the dummy and said in an aggrieved tone, "Didn't you say you played a strong no trump?"
"I do," answered the little old lady. "But my partner plays a weak no trump, about 12 points."
