6-Day Residential Youth Bridge Camp
June 28-July 3, 2015

Sunday, June 28th marked the beginning of the 7th annual, 6-day Youth Bridge Camp Carlinville, II when 35 campers arrived from 14 states. Three of the campers. Benjamin Torio and Ella Reising, first- time campers, and Kaleigh Ishmael, third-year camper, from the St. Louis area received scholarships from Unit 143. There were 22 staff members, who filled the role of teachers, counselors, two administrators and one nurse.

The camp is run and was originally founded by Chris Shaw Jr, Ph.D. and his wife Mary Beth Lattan-Shaw. Steve Reiss and his wife Amy Stabenow are the Camp Registrars. The staff members are from five states, most have worked at the camp previously. To date this is the only overnight bridge camp in the US. The second overnight was begun this year in St. Joseph, MO by Carlinville camp veterans Kathy Rolfe and Phyllis Siegel; this week-long camp began July 5 .

The campers were evaluated on Sunday evening and assigned to one of four groups named Clubs, Diamonds, Hearts and Spades. Lectures were tailored to the students' levels, and table coaches watched as students practiced what they just learned in the lecture. Phyllis Siegel taught the Clubs, Kathy Rolfe of Kansas City taught the Diamonds, Bryan Delfs, ACBL Education Program Manager, taught the Hearts (his sixth year in this position) and Mike Huston, who has earned over 16,000 master points, taught the Spades. The speed at which the campers picked up and practiced the lessons was impressive.

The kids are accompanied by adults at all times, one counselor per three campers, from the dining room building, to the activity center, to the poor or lake, to miniature golf, archery, zip line, giant slide, canoes or any activity that the campers enjoyed during their free time.

After Budget Cuts, Readers Mourn Bridge Column and Movie Clock By MARGARET SULLIVAN APRIL 29, 2015

On Monday, Phillip Alder, The Times's bridge columnist, announced that the column had come to an end. (So did his Times subscription, according to The New York Observer.)

Of the 2,500 who wrote to my office, one reader, Lee Traub, called the demise of the bridge column "another diminishment of daily pleasures," adding that "Mondays, Thursday and Saturdays will never be the same again."

Chuck Ettelson of St. Louis expressed a similar sentiment. He said he understood that times are tough but "having content is one way to retain readers."

Anne and Robert Schumacher of Manhattan put it this way:
We were disheartened, discouraged and taken aback when we opened the New York Times yesterday morning and read Phillip Alder's announcement about the demise of his bridge column. This can't be much of a cost saving measure, as so many other eliminations must have been, such as the weekly TV supplement, the stock pages, Home section and the Friday movie clock. Soon, the obits will disappear, and we won't even know if we're alive or dead.

Now we realize that much information can be obtained from the many web sites on the Internet, but this well written, very informative and influential column is unique and not available elsewhere. We hope and assume you will be deluged with correspondence similar to ours and will pass it along to the powers that be - who perhaps will reconsider this decision.

I also heard from many readers who were upset by the recent discontinuation of the Friday movie-schedule listings, known as the "movie clock." The movie clock was published for the last time earlier this month.

One seven-day print subscriber, Janet Indick, described herself as "lost without that movie schedule." She asked for its replacement, noting "It is hard for seniors who do not use computers or smart phones for everything to obtain the information about the movies playing in their areas." She said that her neighbor feels the same way.

Carlos Gutierrez-Solana wrote to say that "as more and more sections of interest to your home delivery customers are disappearing, sometimes without advance warning, there will be fewer and fewer reasons to maintain a subscription to the New York Times." He added, "I believe that it is wrong to assume that everyone wants everything online." He, too, described himself as "a longtime, seven-day, homedelivery customer."

I spoke on Tuesday to the culture editor, Danielle Mattoon, who had some tough decisions to make when she was told a few months ago to cut nearly 20 percent of her nonpersonnel budget. (Features such as the movie listings and the bridge column come under the culture heading.)

Faced with having to cut close to half a million dollars from her annual budget, Ms. Mattoon also was dealing with another financial angle. In last year's buyouts and layoffs of newsroom staff, she lost a number of staff positions - a net loss of four from a base of 56. (More than four left, and there have been a few hires.) This meant more pressure to rely on freelance staff, who are paid from the non-personnel budget.
"We have fewer culture writers and enormous demands on them," particularly because of new digital efforts, she told me. In order to preserve as much of the freelance budget as possible to help generate the kind of criticism and coverage she finds most valuable, she decided to cut some features.

## Responding to 1NT Openings, Part II - 3rd in a series of 5

by David Lindop

For responding to 1NT, the Summary Chart gives an overview of our methods:

2*: Stayman
2*: 5+ hearts (transfer)

In yesterday's issue we discussed responding with balanced hands and the basic use of Stayman. Now let's take a further look at Stayman and see how it is nicely integrated with Jacoby transfer bids.

## Four-card Major

Stayman is used with a hand of at least invitational strength and at least one four-card major suit. This includes hands which have five or more cards in the other major.
-KJ932 $\downarrow$ AJ7582 $\downarrow 8$ J74 If partner opens 1NT and we hold this hand as responder, we start with $2 \boldsymbol{2}$, not with a transfer to spades. If opener bids $2 \boldsymbol{\downarrow}$, we raise to $4 \boldsymbol{\bullet}$; if opener bids $2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$; we raise to $4 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$. What if opener bids $2 \boldsymbol{\star}$, showing no four-card major? Now we jump to $3 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$, which is forcing and asks opener to choose between 4 and 3 NT . With three-card support for spades, opener will typically bid $4 \boldsymbol{*}$; with a doubleton spade, opener will choose 3NT. If opener chooses 3NT, we'll accept that decision even with our singleton diamond. Opener doesn't have four hearts or three spades so, hopefully, opener has some length and strength in diamonds.
-K973 K10872 Q4 $\boldsymbol{7 4}$ With this hand we start with a response of $2 \star$ to partner's 1 NT opening. If partner bids $2 \downarrow$ or $2 \star$, we make an invitational raise to the three level. If partner bids $2 \downarrow$, we bid $2 \boldsymbol{\downarrow}$, showing an invitational hand with a five-card heart suit. Partner can infer that we also have four spades, since we would have simply started with a transfer to hearts if we didn't have four spades as well. With three-card support for hearts, partner can pass with a minimum and jump to game with a maximum; with a doubleton heart, partner can bid 2NT with a minimum and $3 N T$ with a maximum.
 has at least two spades, so we'll be in at least an eight-card fit.

## Exercising Judgment

Like all conventions, Stayman is a tool. We must decide when and how to use it. Do we have to use Stayman when we have a four-card major? No.

- 983 QUJ $\downarrow$ K103 KJ9 With this hand, many players would simply raise 1NT to 3NT. Even if partner has a four-card spade suit, there doesn't appear to be much advantage to playing in spades instead of notrump. Our spades are weak and our strength is concentrated in the other suits. We should be okay in notrump even if partner has a low doubleton in one of the suits. Besides, we have no ruffing value to make playing in spades an advantage.

Do we need at least invitational strength-8 or more points-to use Stayman? Not if we are short in clubs and feel we can handle any response partner will make.
 $2 \downarrow$, we can pass and hope for the best. It's possible opener has only a doubleton diamond and we'll regret our decision when the deal is over. Since opener doesn't have four hearts or four spades, however, it's likely opener has length in diamonds.
 opener bids $2 \uparrow$ ? We don't want to play there and a bid of $2 N T$ would be invitational. Partner might bid $3 N T$, accepting our invitation, and be defeated several tricks. It is probably best to exercise our judgment and pass.

## Stayman and Slam

Stayman may be used when responder has enough to consider bidding a slam ... but with some cautions.
AAJ103 AQ82 83 \&AK4 This hand has 18 high-card points. If partner opens 1NT, we know we're headed for slam since the partnership has at least 33 combined points. We start with $2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$. If partner bids $2 \boldsymbol{\psi}$ we raise to $6 \boldsymbol{\psi}$; if partner bids $2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$, we raise to $6 \boldsymbol{\downarrow}$; if partner bids $2 \boldsymbol{\downarrow}$, we raise to 6 NT , knowing we don't have an eight-card major-suit fit.

It isn't necessary on this hand, but what if we wanted to ask for aces after finding our fit? For example, suppose the auction begins like this:

| OPENER | RESPONDER |

| 1NT | $2 \leftrightarrow$ |
| $2 \varphi$ | $?$ |

The standard agreement is that 4e the Gerber convention, is used to ask for aces in this situation. 4NT is quantitative, not Blackwood.
493 AKJ2 AJ83 QUJ4 To see why 4NT isn't Blackwood, consider this hand. With 16 high-card points we have enough to invite slam if partner opens 1NT but not enough to commit the partnership to slam. If we didn't have four hearts, we would make a quantitative raise to 4NT. Opener would pass with a minimum and accept (bid slam) with a maximum.

With a four-card major, we begin with $2 \boldsymbol{\varepsilon}$. Suppose partner bids $2 \star$, showing no major, or $2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$, showing four spades but not four hearts. Now what? We don't have an eight-card major-suit fit but still want to invite slam, so we make an invitational jump to 4NT. After using Stayman, we usually reserve 4NT as a quantitative raise, not Blackwood.

We also need to know how to invite slam if we do find a fit after using Stayman. Suppose we hold the above hand and the auction begins:

| OPENER | RESPONDER |
| :---: | :---: |
| 1NT | $2 \stackrel{2}{2}$ |
| $2 \varphi$ | $?$ |

We are too strong to sign off in $4 \vee$ but not strong enough to take the partnership to $6 \boldsymbol{v}$. Asking for aces won't help. We still won't know whether we have enough combined strength for slam. The solution is to raise to $5 \boldsymbol{\bullet}$, showing a hand too strong for $4 \boldsymbol{\bullet}$ but not quite strong enough for $6 \boldsymbol{\bullet}$. Opener may pass with a minimum and bid slam with a maximum.

## Stayman from Opener's Side

As an exercise to make sure we understand the Stayman convention, let's try a couple of hands from opener's side of the table.
$₫$ Q953 AK82 A3 \&J4 With a balanced hand and 16 points, we open 1NT. Partner responds $2 *$. We bid $2 \downarrow$ and partner jumps to $3 N T$. Now what?

We should bid 4 4 . Why did partner use Stayman and then jump to 3NT when we showed our hearts? Partner has enough strength for game but was interested in looking for a spade fit. We can confidently put the partnership in its eight-card fit.

We should pass. 4NT is a quantitative raise, inviting us to bid slam. We have a minimum and should decline the invitation. Why did partner use Stayman? Because partner has a four-card heart suit. What if partner had a spade fit and wanted to ask for aces? Partner would have jumped to $4 \&$, the Gerber convention.

## Jacoby Transfer Bids

Stayman is useful only when we have a four-card major suit. With a five-card or longer major suit, we use Jacoby transfer bids. The basic mechanics are straightforward:

- $2 \checkmark$ asks opener to bid $2 \vee \cdot 2 \boldsymbol{a s k s}$ opener to bid $2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$

Putting transfers to use is a little more challenging. Jacoby transfers allow us to sign off in partscore, invite game or bid game when we have a five-card or longer major suit.

## Six-card or Longer Major

With a six-card or longer major suit, we start by transferring to the major. Then, with 0-7 points, we pass; with 8-9 points we raise; with 10-15, we jump to game in the major.

We can immediately see an advantage of transfers. The weaker hand becomes dummy, leaving the stronger hand concealed, making the defense more challenging. We don't need any high-card strength to make a transfer bid. The weaker we are, the more important that we make the long suit trumps.

↔K97643 82 73 KJ7 With 7 high-card points plus 2 length points for the six-card suit, we have enough to invite game. Over 1NT, we respond $2 \boldsymbol{\downarrow}$. When opener bids $2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$, we raise to $3 \boldsymbol{*}$, inviting game


## Five-card Major

With a five-card major suit, we start by transferring to the major. With 0-7 points, we pass; with 8-9 points we bid 2NT; with 10-15, we jump to 3NT.

↔KJ863 Q95 Q3 843 We respond $2 \boldsymbol{*}$. After partner bids $2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$, we bid $2 N T$ to show a hand of 8-9 points with five spades. With a minimum, opener passes or bids $3 \boldsymbol{4}$. With a maximum, opener can raise to $3 N T$ or jump to $4 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$ with a spade fit.
$\wedge 93 \vee$ AQ752 Q83 $₫$ K104 We respond $2 \star$ to transfer opener to $2 \downarrow$. Then we jump to 3NT. With a doubleton heart, opener passes. With three or more hearts, opener bids $4 \boldsymbol{\varphi}$. We reach the best game contract.

Stayman and Jacoby transfers work in concert after a 1NT opening. Chart 1 provides a useful summary

1. No, you may not change seats/direction during a session without the director's permission. If you begin as East, you must remain as East. In a Howell movement, you must remain as either North \& East or South \& West.

3. When given a set of options after an irregularity or an infraction, a player may not consult his partner.
4. An insufficient bid may always be accepted.
