## A Tireless Champion of the Game APRIL 29, 2015 <br> By PHILLIP ALDER

Alan Truscott was born in England, one of the 1925 bridge babies. (Other leading players born that year included Dorothy Hayden Truscott, Edgar Kaplan, Robert Nail and Tim Seres.) Truscott was on the British team that won the 1961 European Open Team Championship. He came to New York City in February 1962 to compete in the Bermuda Bowl. While in New York, he was spotted by Richard Frey writing newspaper reports. Impressed by his work ethic, Frey asked Truscott if he would like to move to the city and work for the American Contract Bridge League (then based in New York), in particular to help Frey produce the first Official Encyclopedia of Bridge. As Truscott had instantly liked the bustling metropolis, he agreed.

Then, on Jan. 1, 1964, Truscott took over The New York Times bridge column. He wrote it daily until March 1994, when it was reduced to three days a week. He continued until April 2005, when he retired because of ill health, having written some 12,750 columns. He died on Sept. 4 that year.

He seemed to have unlimited stamina, working on six editions of the encyclopedia, writing 13 successful books and winning three national championships. He was elected to the American Contract Bridge League Hall of Fame in 2001.

When not working, he completed the 1986 New York City Marathon. He also had a prodigious memory for humorous song lyrics, with which he would entertain dinner companions. He was also a demon at the game Botticelli (Google it) and virtually unbeatable at the Cutlery Game, in which each player takes it in turn to say, truthfully, "I've never " (i.e., smoked a cigar, drank liquor, etc.), because he had, in $\overline{\text { fact, never consumed coffee or tea, smoked a cigarette, worn a ring or }}$ had any siblings.


His excellence as a declarer is highlighted by the diagramed deal. Even looking at all 52 cards, it is not immediately apparent how to make three no-trump after West leads a low spade to dummy's nine, but Truscott worked it out seeing only 26 cards. What did he do?

Declarer realized that if he cashed his three diamond winners, then played the ace and another club, even if West had to take the trick, he could exit with a heart or the ace and another spade to defeat the contract.

Truscott saw his best chance. At Trick 2, he played a heart to his queen. When that held, he cashed the heart ace and his three top diamonds, then exited with the spade king. West cashed his spade winners, bringing everyone down to three cards.

West had three clubs, dummy held the diamond jack and club queenjack, and declarer retained one heart and ace-doubleton of clubs. West, forced to lead a club, had to give Truscott the last three tricks with two clubs and the diamond jack regardless of the location of the club king.

Truscott was the Isaac Asimov and P. G. Wodehouse of bridge, never tiring and never resting.

## Handling Interference over 1NT - 5th in a series of 5

To complete our discussion of handling notrump opening bids and responses, let's take another look at the Summary Chart:

## When 1NT is Doubled

A basic partnership principle is that all conventional agreements are "off " -no longer apply-if an opponent interferes, unless the partnership has made an agreement to the contrary. As the chart shows, the Standard agreement is to use Stayman and transfers in response to an opening 1NT. Suppose we hold this hand as South and partner opens 1NT.
 doubles:

WEST NORTH EAST SOUTH
1NT Double ?
If we now respond $2 \downarrow$, partner might pass if we haven't discussed this situation! We'd have to bid an old-fashioned $2 \boldsymbol{\downarrow}$ if we wanted to play partscore in hearts.

Does this approach make sense? It did at one time, when a double of 1 NT was primarily for penalty. Responder might have a weak hand with length in a minor suit and want to sign off in $2 *$ or instead of passing 1NT. However, in modern competitive bidding, the double of 1NT is often used as some form of takeout rather than penalty. So, the popular style is to agree to ignore the double and continue to use both Stayman and transfers since the double has not used up any bidding room. That's the agreement adopted by many players and included on the Summary Chart: "responses remain same if 1 NT is doubled." So, we can confidently bid 2 with this hand and expect partner to treat it as a transfer to $2 \boldsymbol{\varphi}$.

If 1 NT is doubled, another call becomes available, the redouble. The standard agreement is that this shows about 8 or more points, with the expectation of making at least 1NT and interest in doubling the opponents if they run to some other contract.

## After a 2* Overcall

In today's competitive style, it has become common to give an artificial meaning to a 2 overcall of 1 NT - typically to show a one-suited or two-suited-type of hand. Since there's still room to use all the conventional responses except Stayman, we've adopted the popular agreement that "responses remain the same after a overcall except that double is now Stayman." In other words, "systems are on."

The reason for using the double to replace Stayman is that it is not too effective to use a double for penalty if the $2 \boldsymbol{o v e r c a l l ~ i s ~ ( u s u a l l y ) ~ a r t i f i c i a l . ~}$ For example, suppose we have this hand 83 KJ74 A1087 842 and the auction begins:

WEST NORTH EAST SOUTH
1NT 2a* ? The overcall is alerted as showing some one-suited hand.
Double might leave us awkwardly placed if the opponents now bid to $2 \boldsymbol{2}$. We don't have a suitable hand for a penalty double and we might have missed a heart fit. It's also inconvenient to use a cuebid of 3s Stayman, since that might get the partnership too high if partner has a minimum for the 1NT opening. So, having double available as Stayman is useful in this situation. This agreement won't always work well and some partnerships may prefer more complex arrangements, but it's better to have a reasonable agreement than none at all.

## After 2ヶ or Higher Overcall

When the opponent's overcall is $2 \star$ or higher, it takes away both Stayman and at least some of the transfer bids, so our agreement is that "transfers are off after a 2 or higher overcall and a cuebid is Stayman." Again, there are other possibilities, but this should be fine for most partnerships.

Suppose we hold this hand as South $\$$ Q3 $\mathbf{~ K 1 0 8 7 6 4 ~} \boldsymbol{7 4} 942$ and the bidding starts off:
WEST NORTH EAST SOUTH
1NT 2 ?
We don't have much but, opposite a 1NT opening, we don't want to let East buy the contract in diamonds. Since transfers are off, we simply compete by bidding a natural $2 \boldsymbol{\varphi}$.

Our $2 \boldsymbol{\text { bid }}$ is not forcing but it does show some values, since we could pass with a very weak hand once East overcalls. With a good fit for hearts, opener should be willing to compete higher. There is a school of thought that transfers should continue to be used in this situation with a

double of 2 saying "East stole my bid so my double is a transfer to hearts." This has some merit and is an extension of our agreement to use a double of a $2<$ overcall as Stayman. However, most partnerships prefer to reserve a double of $2 \vee$ for this type of hand: $\uparrow A 75 \vee 64 \leqslant$ QJ95 2J1084. This is a good, old-fashioned penalty double of East's overcall. Partner has about 15 or more points and at least two diamonds, so we expect to collect a sizeable penalty.

What do we do if this is our hand $₫ 3 \vee$ Q976 $>72 \mathrm{~J} 84$ and the auction begins this way:
WEST NORTH EAST SOUTH
1NT 2\& ?
We don't have a suitable hand for a penalty double and we'd like to look for a heart fit. A cuebid of $3 \boldsymbol{s}$ takes the place of Stayman. Over our $3 \boldsymbol{s}$ bid, opener will bid $4 \boldsymbol{\square}$ with a four-card heart suit; otherwise, opener will bid 3NT. If opener bids 3NT, we'll have to pass and hope partner has something in spades-which is likely in view of the 1NT opening and the fact partner doesn't have length in hearts.

It may seem like a lot to commit the partnership to game with this hand, but that's what we'd probably do if East passed. With 9 high-card points plus 1 length point without the interference!

How do we handle this hand if partner opens 1NT and the auction proceeds:

```
WEST NORTH EAST SOUTH
    1NT 2v ?
```

We were planning to transfer to $2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$ and then jump to $3 N T$, but transfers don't apply after the overcall. A bid of $2 \boldsymbol{a}$ would be competitive and partner is likely to pass. Instead, we revert to traditional methods and make a forcing jump to 3a. This asks opener to choose between 3NT and 44. So, we should be able to handle most auctions when the opponents interfere over 1NT. If we want a more sophisticated approach, we'll have to adopt more complex methods such as Lebensohl, which are outside our Standard framework.

## Responding to 2NT

Once we agree to use Stayman and Jacoby transfer bids over 1NT, it's typically assumed that we will also use them after a 2NT opening... although we should discuss this with partner.
 convention works essentially the same way as over 1NT but there are small differences-apart from the fact that we use $3 \boldsymbol{2}$ instead of $2 \boldsymbol{*}$.

With the above hand, we would pass over 1 NT since we'd be stuck if partner responded $2 \downarrow$. Since partner promises 20-21 points for $2 N T$, we can afford to use Stayman with as few as 4 or 5 points. However, there's no room to invite opener to game over 2NT. As responder, we'll have to decide whether to stop in partscore or go for the game bonus.

The situation is similar with Jacoby transfer bids. If partner opens 2NT and we hold 831087642 QJ7 84 , we would respond $3 \leqslant$ to transfer opener to $3 \uparrow$, but then we'll have to use our judgment-guesswork?-to decide whether to pass or raise to $4 \mathbf{v}$. Another change is that we don't use extended transfers over 2NT. That is, we don't use 3 a to ask opener to bid $4 \Leftrightarrow$ so we can pass or bid $4 \checkmark$ as a signoff. With a weak hand and a long minor suit, we simply pass and hope opener can scramble eight tricks in 2NT.

3a can be given various conventional meanings, but all are outside the scope of Standard. Instead, we simply don't use that bid.

## After a $2 *$ Opening

Both Stayman and Jacoby transfers are also used after an artificial strong 2 opening and a waiting response when opener rebids 2NT or 3NT. For example, suppose we are South and the auction begins:

| WEST | NORTH | EAST | SOUTH |

 opener to show a four-card major. If opener bids $3 \uparrow$, we'll raise to $4 \boldsymbol{4}$. If opener bids $3 \leqslant 3 \bullet$, we'll bid 3NT.

With this hand 83 Q9642 $\boldsymbol{*}$ Q1084, we'd bid $3 \leqslant$ to transfer opener to $3 \checkmark$ and then bid 3NT. This tells opener we have a five-card heart suit and let's opener choose between 3NT and $4 \boldsymbol{\varphi}$.

The situation is different if responder makes a positive response to $2 *$. Suppose we have this hand $\boldsymbol{\wedge} \vee \mathrm{KQ} 1076 \leqslant 73 *$ Q1084 and the auction begins:

| WEST | NORTH | EAST | SOUTH |
| :---: | :---: | :---: | :---: |
|  | $2 \boldsymbol{2}$ | Pass | $2 \boldsymbol{1}$ |
| Pass | $2 N T$ | Pass | $?$ |

If we now bid $3 \boldsymbol{e}$, it is a natural bid showing clubs; it is not Stayman. We've already announced a good five-card heart suit and would simply bid 3a if we wanted to show a four-card spade suit. There's no need for Stayman or transfers.

So, we are now prepared for all opening notrump bids and responses.
In tomorrow's issue we'll look end the week looking at defensive carding signals.

## 18 Ways to Make Your Bridge Life Easier

* No, you may not change seats/direction during a session without the director's permission. If you begin as East, you must remain as East.
* North may think he is in charge of the table, but it is a cooperative effort among players at the table throughout the session.
* When given a set of options after an irregularity or an infraction, a player may not consult his partner.
- The director alone has the power to assign an adjusted score.
- The director alone will determine the extent of the unauthorized information (but consulting others can be very helpful).
* When you hesitate, you do not bar your partner, even when the opponents tell you that you have. Don't let the opponents rule at your table, call for the director.
* You may never ask a question for partner's benefit.
* If you make an assumption, there is no rectification due based on your own misunderstanding.
- An insufficient bid may always be accepted.
- A call out of rotation may be accepted unless it is an illegal call.
* Face down opening leads may only be withdrawn with the permission of the director, and then only for cause.
- Questions should be withheld until the face down opening lead is made.
* A declarer's played card may not be changed simply because declarer pulled the wrong card from his hand.
* Don't detach a card unless that is the card you intend to play, and then only at your turn.
* The phrase "In the same breath" is not found in the Law book.
* The right to correct your partner's incorrectly pointed trick expires when the lead is made to the next trick.
* Claims often help move the game along. When a claim is made, play may not be continued.
- Know how many tricks are won before replacing the cards in the board.
