## $\overbrace{\text { Zero Tolerance Policy }}^{0}$ Be cool! Bridge is fun.

We are committed to improving acceptable player behavior at all times. The ultimate purpose of the Z-T policy is to create a much more pleasant atmosphere in our game. We are attempting to eradicate unacceptable behavior in order to make the game of bridge more enjoyable for all.

If a player at the table behaves in an unacceptable manner, the director should be called immediately. Annoying behavior, embarrassing remarks, or any other conduct which might interfere with the enjoyment of the game is specifically prohibited; the director has the authority to assess disciplinary penalties.

## Recorder Forms



Recorder forms are available from the Head Director. Milt Zlatic is the District 8 Recorder. The aim of the recorder system is to establish a method of dealing with complaints that: 1) by themselves do not warrant the filing of formal charges; 2) are very serious but there is only the implication of wrongdoing without substantial evidence necessary to bring formal charges or 3 ) should be addressed by counseling and/or education.

More Bridge Quips


* A player who can't defend accurately should try to be declarer. Alfred Sheinwold
* How many Bridge players do you need to change a light bulb? Four. One to change the bulb and 3 to tell him how he could have done it better.
How can you tell if someone is a lousy bridge player? He has 5 smiling Kibitzers watching him play.
Isn't it a shame how $99 \%$ of bridge players give the whole game a bad name.
* How many bridge partner jokes are there? Just two, all the rest are true.
When a wise partner holds his tongue, he says more than then when he speaks.
* What's the difference between my partner and a trampoline? I have to take off my shoes before 1 jump on a trampoline.
* If you cannot annoy your partner, there is little point in playing Bridge.
* A suggestion from Tournament Director Harry Goldwater that barring obvious consequences, a lead out of turn should generally be accepted. The rationale being that if a player does not know whose lead it is probably does not know the right lead either!
* There is only one thing worse than playing bridge -- and that is not playing bridge.
* There is a fine line between wanting to play bridge every day and mental illness.

The Blackwood convention only tells us how many aces and kings partner holds. If we need to know which aces and kings partner holds, we must use control-showing bids. Control-showing bids also help us deal with voids and singletons.

Controls in a Suit Contract<br>First round: Ace or void<br>Second-round: King or singleton

## Control-Showing Process

Showing controls takes a different approach to slam bidding than Blackwood. Instead of asking partner about the number of aces held, we show an ace -or some other control - that we hold. In turn, partner is expected to show a control, and the auction continues until the partnership discovers whether there are enough controls to bid a slam.

## Recognizing a Control Bid

How do we know when we're into a control-showing situation in a $2 / 1$ auction? Once the partnership has agreed on WHERE, the only remaining question is HOW HIGH: Game or Slam? If we aren't interested in slam, we simply stop in game in the agreed trump suit. So:

## Showing Controls After 2/1

Once the trump suit has been agreed, the bid of another suit is a control-showing bid with interest in slam.

Responder will show one ace, and whether opener stops in 54 or continues to $6 \boldsymbol{A}$, the partnership is too high. The defenders can take the first three heart tricks. Before taking over the captaincy and using Blackwood, opener should be reasonably sure the partnership has at least second-round control in every suit. Opener knows that's the case in spades, diamonds, and clubs, but needs to find out whether responder has either first- or secondround control in hearts. So opener initiates a control-showing sequence:


Stopping the Process
With no interest in slam, opener would simply bid 44 once spades have been agreed upon. So opener's $4^{*}$ bid is a controlshowing bid. Responder cooperates with a control-showing bid of 4 . Opener doesn't have a control in the heart suit, so opener returns to the agreed trump suit, 4^. Responder also doesn't have a control in the heart suit and doesn't want to venture beyond game, so responder passes and the partnership stops safely at the game level.

How does responder know opener's 4^ bid isn't a further control-showing bid? The partnership needs a way to stop below slam when it doesn't have the required controls, so the trump suit is not included when showing controls. A return to the trump suit says, "I have nothing further to show." It doesn't necessarily end the auction. Partner may still have more to say, but it does allow the partnership to stop in a game contract.
There are other ways to stop the control-showing process. With enough information, either player may simply jump to the slam level. Or either player may switch to the Blackwood convention by bidding 4NT.

## Stopping the ControlShowing Process

The partnership can stop the control-showing process by:

- Returning to the agreed trump suit.
- Jumping to slam.
- Bidding Blackwood

Why use Blackwood after the partnership has been showing controls?

- Controls in the trump suit are not included in the control-showing process. Blackwood may still be needed to confirm that the partnership has enough controls.
- There may be some ambiguity between first- and second-round controls. Blackwood can be used to clarify the situation.

Let's modify the earlier hands to see how effective control-showing can be.

After the trump suit has been agreed with responder's raise to 34 , opener makes a move toward slam with the 4* bid. Responder cooperates by bidding $4 \mathbf{v}$. That's exactly what opener wanted to hear. There's no longer a concern that the opponents can take the first two heart tricks, so opener bids Blackwood to confirm that the partnership isn't missing two aces, and confidently goes to slam when responder shows an ace. Control-showing bids followed by Blackwood will often work when an early jump to Blackwood needs to be avoided.

## Guidelines for Controls

The control-showing process can be challenging. It requires both partners to be on the same wavelength. Here are some useful agreements:

- Once the control-showing process is initiated, partner is expected to cooperate below the game level, even with a minimum hand.
- Controls are rarely shown if they take the partnership beyond game.
- Both first- and second-round controls can be shown.
- Controls are typically shown 'up the line.'
- Controls are not shown in the agreed trump suit. Blackwood must be used to check on the total number of aces and kings held by the partnership.

Let's take a closer look in this issue at the first two guidelines.

## Cooperation

If partner makes a move toward slam with a control-showing bid, do we have to cooperate? Obviously if we have extra values, we want to help get to slam. We might even take charge and use Blackwood. After all, if partner is interested in slam and we are also interested, what's stopping us?
However, if we don't have extra values, do we have to make a control-showing bid once partner starts the process? In general, we cooperate with partner below the game level when we have something useful to show, even when we have no extra values.


After agreeing on hearts as the trump suit, responder shows interest in slam with a control-showing bid of 4_. Although opener has no extra values, showing the $\star$ A doesn't take the partnership beyond game. It turns out that a diamond control is exactly what responder was looking for. Now responder can safely use Blackwood to check for aces. When the partnership has all the aces, responder can even make a try for a grand slam by asking about kings. When opener shows none, responder settles for a small slam.

## Avoid Control-Bidding Beyond Game

With rare exceptions, avoid making a control-showing bid that takes the partnership beyond game. When bidding beyond game, the default action is to bid Blackwood to check for aces and kings.

If opener continues the control-showing process by bidding 44, the partnership will get too high. So opener simply returns to $4 \boldsymbol{\bullet}$, leaving any further move to responder. Here, responder passes, knowing that the partnership doesn't have a control in diamonds.

## Suggested Auction

When things look too good to be true, they usually are. If you ever pick up a hand like that held by North, you should probably be suspicious . . . especially after you have read the story about the hand. Still, if you were dealt this hand, you'd probably expect to take all the tricks with hearts as the trump suit, even if partner has nothing. Open with what you think you can make, a grand slam in hearts. If you are a duplicate player, you might want to take your time and open with a strong two-bid. If partner has the $\downarrow \mathrm{A}$, you would want to reach the slightly higher-scoring contract of 7NT/

As North, you might be surprised to hear East double your $7 \uparrow$ contract. Perhaps East has the $A$ and is expecting to take a trick with it. You might even redouble.

East will be quite surprised to hear North bid a grand slam in hearts. The astonishment shouldn't prevent East from making a penalty double, since East knows the heart suit is breaking badly for declarer . . . very badly. If that wasn't the case, of course, there would be no story behind
the hand.

## Suggested Opening Lead

East has an easy choice of leads against a heart contract. East would start with the $A$, not caring too much whether or not it wins a trick.

## Play of the Hand

As you are likely to have discovered by now, if you have played the hand, it is a disaster for North-South. In a heart contract, North can take no more than six tricks. East keeps leading diamonds at every opportunity and North never gets a trick with any of the high cards in spades or clubs. In fact, North-South can't make even a game contract. Seeing all the hands, the best the partnership can do is make a contract of $3 \boldsymbol{e}$ or 4 . Not what one would expect with all those high cards.

## Defense

There's nothing that needs to be said on the defenders' behalf. Before congratulating each other on the large penalty they are likely to collect, perhaps it's time for the complete story . . .

## The Story Behind the Hand

This is the notorious 'Mississippi Heart Hand' and it dates from the days of whist. During the days when Whist was all the rage, bets were placed on the outcome. Gambling with cards had become a passion among card players, which created the profession of card shark. A similar hand to the one below was reported by Hoyle in 1747, an era when players were also placing bets on different players. The hand below was first described and published by Mr. Thomas Matthews in 1804. It represents a hand which Mississippi card sharks on the riverboats would sucker innocent victims to lose their money and/or to bet their money on fixed hands. It was also a manner during the Civil War period among the Yankee players to dupe the Southerners, who would place heavy bets on the outcome. In any case, such hands became very popular among card professionals and card cheaters during the era of Bridge Whist.

South, the declarer and/or sucker, would bid game, if not slam, on his holding. However, as the cards lie, South is unable to make a game contract, much less a slam in any denomination. The best South can do is to take 9 tricks in a Spade contract or 10 tricks in a Club contract. Of course, the lead by West would always be a Diamond. The sucker bet would be made on the guideline set forth by Bridge Whist, that any contract could be doubled and redoubled ad infinitum, or until the card professionals thought would be the upper limit of the paying ability of the victim.

It is reported that a Mr. Charles M. Schwab had to pay a minimum of $\$ 10,000$ when playing South as the victim. Schwab donated the Schwab Cup to the bridge community, which, beginning in 1962, is the prize of the World Pair Olympiad. It was first presented by Mr. Charles M. Schwab in 1933 for the contest between the United States and England. This cup, originally presented to the winner of this match by Mr. Schwab, was later donated to the World Bridge Federation by the Culbertson heirs.
